The doors open at 12:30 and the meeting starts at 1:00 Saturday, June $10^{\rm th}$ ---I hope you can attend!!

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

FROM THE OFFICE DOWN THE HALL Sam Delauter, Assistant Superintendent

I am sure that everyone that made it to the May meeting had a great time. For those that did not make it to Steel Is King, I hope you can next year because you missed a good one. As I have said in the past, if you can carpool to this kind of meeting, it can be a really enjoyable experience. For my trip to Parkersburg, I rode with David Oliverio and Matt Kearns. While we had discussed a itinerary for the trip, we decided to just take it easy and not rush. This made for a nice easy drive and gave us plenty of time for conversation. Since we still left early enough to have plenty of time, we were able to stay at both Paul's and Dave's layouts for as long as we wanted. After the layout tours and meeting we were able to visit the Mid-Ohio Valley Model Railroad Club. While I have been there before, it is always nice to visit again. The members of this club are always very friendly and welcoming.

While at the train club, I had a nice conversion with one of their younger members. He started telling me he does his own painting with an airbrush. As we spoke, I found out that he does much more than just airbrushing. He builds resins kits as well as his own painting, decals and weathering. He showed me some pictures of his stuff. He does a really good job. It was really great seeing someone his age doing this kind of modeling.

Since none of us had to be back at a certain time and we were in Parkersburg, we spent some time with David doing research for his layout. Right next to the train club is the former B&O yard through which their mainline ran. Many of the old buildings that surrounded this yard are still standing, several were of great interest for modeling. We spent a while at these buildings for David to get photos to use with his layout. Next we spent some time at the B&O bridge that runs through town and crosses the river into Ohio. This bridge is interesting even if you don't model the B&O.

After that we headed back home. Before we ended our day, we did a little test running on David's layout. We test ran a BL2 on his helix. There were two things notable about this. One is the way David routes power to the helix. The helix is built with threaded rod for the may supports. Each level is adjustable up and down by tightening or loosening a pair of nuts. These rods are hooked up to the track power. One rod serves as one electrical pole, a second rod serves as the other electrical pole. The feeder wires are held in place by the adjusting nuts. I thought that was a really great idea as it makes it easy to isolate the helix. Also the lack of a bus wire is just one less thing to have to make and to wire. The other notable thing was that this was the first train run on his layout. While he does not have all of his track laid yet, it was great to see something run on his layout finally.

There is no T-TRAK news to report, but I have found some interesting things on YouTube. I also saw a couple of my friends on the video.

There are two videos on YouTube on the Ohio N Scale Weekend Train show in Marysville, OH. on May 20, 2023. They are by *The Train Couple* and *The Millennial Modeler*. Both show a lot on the T-TRAK modules.

I am a member of the N Scale groups.io. There was a thread this month started by another member who posted that he was having trouble with his N Scale code 60 track from Lionel, which brought up a lot of responses concerning whether Lionel ever sold N scale. Being an N scale modeler since the 1970s, I have never seen Lionel produce anything in N scale but they did sell some locomotives in 1:160 some years ago. The locomotives were

PASSENGER MANIFEST John Harris, Membership Chair

Great trip to Parkersburg to enjoy Paul Lapointe's and Dave Stout's layouts. An added bonus was to visit the Mid Ohio Valley Club and their multiple layouts. We saw so many trains in one day, it was almost like going to convention. Special thanks are also due to Rhonda Stout for the great food and drink. No one could have gone away hungry. Those who could not make the trip missed out on a good day of food, fellowship, and trains even if the weather was not the greatest.

While model trains are obviously the main reason we gather together, it is perhaps the love for the full scale units that triggered the interest. With COVID protocols perhaps behind us, it may be time to look at getting out and doing a visit to the real thing. It has been a while since members of the Coal Division have been able play with the big boys. In the past, we have traveled to Nelsonville, OH to ride on the Hocking Valley, Elkins, WV for a trip on the Tygart Valley Flyer, and Romney to chase birds on the Potomac Eagle. If memory serves there was even a trip to Cass to ride to the top of Bald Knob.

For many of our group, particularly those who have recently joined, these would be a new experience and may be worth repeating. There are, however, a few new opportunities that might be worth considering. As I mentioned a few months ago, the Western Maryland Scenic Railroad has restored and put back into service on a regular basis the former C&O 1309 2-6-6-2 Mallet. Painted now in WM colors, it runs from Cumberland, MD to Frostburg, MD over a 4.5 hour trip across the Allegheny Mountains. Costs vary from \$45 per person for coach or open air to \$110 for lounge car or \$135 for dome car service. A link to the train is included here as reference https://wmsr.com/classes-of-train-ride-service. As Cumberland is a 3 ½ hour trip from Charleston so this would be an overnight trip for sure if not a two night trip.

Another option could be back to Cass. While another trip to Bald Knob is a possibility, the State of WV has recently reconstructed the bridge and repaired other right of way damage to the former C&O trackage that was washed out in 1985. The train leaves Cass behind Shay #5 and follows the Greenbrier River to Durbin and returns. Coaches are vintage closed heavy weights with a variety of seating arrangements. The roundtrip fare is \$79 per person and the trip lasts approximately 5 hours. Lunch consisting of cold cuts is included but there are additional out of pocket options while in Durbin. https://mountainrailwv.com/tour/greenbrierexpress/. Cass is 3

hours from Charleston so again, this would prove to be an overnight trip.

Still possibilities might include a revisit of one of the trains previously listed. It has been a while for some of these. The Potomac Eagle Scenic train runs out of Romney in the Eastern Panhandle of WV. This 3 hour trip runs through the trough of the south branch of the Potomac River where there is said to be a 90% chance of seeing bald eagles. Several classes of service are available and are defined by seating and dining options available. These range from \$65 per person to \$110 and can be viewed on the attached link. https://potomaceagle.com/plan/choose-your-trip/. All day trips are also available is it premium dining service. Perhaps not an option suited to a group but may be something individuals would find interesting.

Others may have some ideas of alternative trips so feel free to throw those options on the table. It has been suggested that even a day trip on Amtrak to the Greenbrier would be a possibility. The Cardinal runs Sunday, Wednesday, and Friday leaving Charleston eastbound at approximately 8: 30 arriving in White Sulphur Springs at noon. Return leaves White Sulphur Springs at 5:00 and arrives Charleston at 8:30. We can eat lunch on train or explore the grounds at the Greenbrier and have lunch at Draper's or the Forum or other venue. Cost range from \$65 to \$110 per person round trip depending on dates with senior discounts available for those of us with grey hair.

Regardless, I throw these ideas out there for future discussion and suggest we consider this a way of enhancing the membership experience. It would typically be available to family and friends and could even be a way of introducing others to our group. I am looking to have the discussion to test the waters and determine if there is an interest in doing one of these trips over the summer or fall. Logistics will always be an issue and some may not be interested in doing something with so much travel involved. I want to get it out there to see what YOU think. I have no particular dates in mind and it may not be possible to work out all the details for this year. But, if there is interest, we will see what we can work out.

If you can not ride the real thing, at least keep working on the small versions. I hope to see you in June and continue the discussion.

NMRA INTERCHANGE: A USER'S COMMENTS Patrick Miller

As you may have heard by now, the NMRA launched the Interchange in January. The NMRA Interchange in an informal online venue in which members may exchange ideas, learn, collaborate and share information. The Interchange originated from the desire of the NMRAx team to connect members worldwide instantaneously in an informal way.

The NMRA Interchange uses the Discord platform, which allows Divisions and Regions to meet hybrid or online settings without the added costs of a subscription or fee-based online meeting software. That's right folks, it is free to join!

The Discord platform allows Interchange users to meet using text and voice chat, as well as video conferencing in hangout rooms. Each Region and Division also have their own space where only the local members can see what is posted. Even YOU can have your own chan-

nel under the Interchange to share your model railroading journey.

My first impression of the Interchange using the mobile app was a positive. After downloading the Discord app and following the onboarding procedures, I only have to tap on one icon and I'm immediately in the Interchange. The Discord platform seems to combine a social media flavor similar to Twitter with the traditional message board format. However, the Interchange is restricted to NMRA members, so the politics and negativity of social media have been nonexistent thus far. At first, the mobile app did seems to be visually "busy" with lots of channels to look at, but I learned how to minimize the subgroups so the active channels aren't so visually overwhelming. Discord is also available for use on a PC. I urge the members of the Coal Division to give this new membership benefit a try!






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
