

FROM THE OFFICE DOWN THE HALL Sam Delauter, Assistant Superintendent

When I checked my email a couple of days ago, the newsletter deadline was sitting in my inbox. Often I don't know what to write about and spend a lot of time trying to think of something interesting to say. If even one person takes something of use from it then I have done my job. It's even better when multiple people find the article useful. I will say that I went to school for music not writing. If we did not have such a great team reviewing and editing the newsletter it would not be of the quality that the newsletter is.

This month was one of those that I was not sure what to write. Since I haven't been doing much modeling lately, I didn't have anything new to write about on that front. With that out of the equation, there is a statement that I am going to make that may seem weird to many modelers. Not every line or branch will see boxcars in service.

Let that sink in for a minute. It seems an odd thought to me that not every line in America will necessarily see any boxcars in service. As I have been watching the Kanawha River Railroad (KNWA) almost everyday of the week, it occurred to me that I can't remember the last time that I saw a boxcar. This realization really threw me for a loop. I, like many other modelers, probably just assume that every line will have at least one customer online that will receive boxcars. In the case of the KNWA this is not the case. What we do see is a few gondolas of

varying types, a lot of 2 bay covered hoppers, various tank cars, and a lot of open hoppers. This isn't to say that there are no boxcars. There are but they are on through trains and those are not common, at least not during the work day.

When you look at the industries that the KNWA services it isn't all that surprising that you won't see any boxcars. The bigger customers that the KNWA serves are the mines and the chemical plants. Some of the smaller ones are the potash loading facility, Lehigh Sand, Appalachian Railcar Services, and RJ Recycling. While there may be other customers online, I am only familiar with those in the Kanawha Valley. If there are more I would love to hear about them.

So how does this translate to our modeling? Something we should keep in mind is that we don't have to have an industry for every type of freight car. Not having every type of freight car being delivered would add extra interest if done well. On my N scale Interstate RR layout, the only switching is for coal hoppers. There is a small yard that often is home to several cars that are not hoppers. I also run a couple of boxcars in a manifest train. While they have no customers on my layout, it adds a little variety and really sells the theme of the layout, a railroad where Coal is King.

T-TRAK Herb Parsons, Chair

I ordered modules from Stuart Denniston and Klawndyke.com to check how well they are assembled and appearance. I ordered a inside curve corner module from Stuart Denniston that arrived completely assembled, that is the reason his cost more than others. It was well made and looked great. For the photo I used track I had on hand, I have to order more track to finish the module.

I ordered 2 modules from Klawndyke's, 1 double and the bridge module. I had to assemble these, and they went together easy using wood glue and masking tape to hold it while the glue set. Where the modules I purchased from Osborn Models needed a 4 page instruction sheet, Klawndyke's had only a 1-page sheet with instructions and illustrations.

Compared to other modules I've purchased, I would recommend these especially the Stuart Denniston if you don't like building kits.

PASSENGER MANIFEST John Harris, Membership Chair

In the last issue of the newsletter, I mentioned the possibility of the Division taking a rail fan trip to one of the area scenic train excursions. The over-whelming choice was the Western Maryland Scenic Railroad out of Cumberland. The former C&O 1309 2-6-6-2 Mallet is apparently presently not running the trip but is expected back in service latter this year. Meanwhile, I will be looking into details and schedules to see what the options are for a group trip might be. This will include cost for each type of service from coach to dome car service. Transportation to and from will be up to individual but I am sure carpooling will be an option out of Charleston. Likewise accommodations will be up to each individual but I should be able to provide a list of options. More to follow.

At the Parkersburg meeting, a suggestion was made provide an opportunity to "get to know the modeler." Some time ago there were a series of articles in the newsletter that did just that. Each article was written by the member and included a history and description of the layout, photos of their layout or models, and history of what brought them to the hobby and projection of where they might be headed. I personally enjoyed the process as it gave me an opportunity to access what I was doing and focus on what things were important to my railroad. That was perhaps 15 years ago. Perhaps it is time for a reprint or even better, a reassessment or rewrite. I encourage each of you to consider doing such an article as a way of getting to know you and what are your passions for the hobby.

This need not be a daunting task. It should be fun. It should simply tell us more about you as a modeler, what you enjoy about the hobby, what are your current projects or status of your layout. Even if you do not have a layout, you might have dioramas or individual models that tell a story. I am sure each of you have read articles in Model Railroader, NMRA Magazine, or Model Railroad Crafts-

man that do the same. These can be used as a guide or at least give you a direction as to what topics might be included. In short, it is really about getting to know who you are and what you are doing in the hobby. If you do not have a layout, that is fine. You still have something that draws into membership in NMRA.

Photos can be an important part of this but need not be a stumbling block. Photos may be overall of a layout or better still, close ups showing details. They may be photos of individual models or projects. It is however important that they be taken under good lighting. Flash photographs generally do not create this effect. Supplemental lighting may be required.

That said, I realize that not everyone is confident in their writing skills or even comfortable talking about themselves. As such, I am willing to assist. This could be in the form of an interview that helps draw out and articulate what you are doing and why are you doing it. Or, might just be assisting in getting your thoughts down in writing and editing what you have put together. I also offer my camera and photography skills to help capture the best views of your layout or individual models.

This will of course not happen overnight. I will take a several months to get this organized and get a schedule worked out for publication. I would request that everyone give consideration to joining into this endeavor. We will talk more about this at upcoming meetings. Unfortunately I will not be at our July meeting as wife and I will be traveling and can not even join by internet, but I wanted to get you thinking about this well in advance. Please feel free to reach out and let me know of your interest in participating. 

Mark's CM&WS boomflat

This model was made specifically to go with a Walthers American crane. Its design is a composite of all the many boomflats that I have seen in my thirty year career on the railroad. Since it was built by the CM&WS shops, it follows no commercially produced design but it incorporates features found on any good boomflat. The model is an MDC flat with 133 parts added, 122 of them being scratchbuilt, not counting trucks and couplers. It is painted in maintenance of way orange with light weathering. Decals were from Microscale lettering sheets and maintenance of way data sheets. The hooks on the lifting chains wee hand made as were the fuel pump box and hose reel, the fuel tank, and the spreader bar. The model took approximately 60 hours to complete.



Robert's 120 Ton Industrial Brownhoist Wrecking Crane

This 120 ton capacity wrecking crane, C&O #17, was built in 1929 by the Industrial Works, Bay City, Michigan as company number 3817. Representing one of the most popular crane types, they were used in large numbers by almost all Americal railroads as well as in export. Many are still in use to-day.

- Tichy Train Group kit
- Air brushed with Floquil Railroad Colors (engine black)
- Weathered with Doc O'Brien's weathering powders
- Kadee Arch Bar trucks with couplers
- C&O decals left over from other projects

C&O #X1866 Boom Car

- Constructed from an old flat car with steel coil load
- Steel load removed and sides added that were cut from an old gondola
- Air brushed with Vallejo acrylic paint
- Lettering and numbers individually applied from a decal sheet
- Weathered with Pan Pastels
- Trucks and couplers from Micro-Trains
- Boom cradle constructed from styrene
- Load includes coil of cables made from thread, pallet, and assorted wooden blocks

C&O #WR 91

- Tichy Train Group boom car kit
- Changed into truck car (did not install cabin)
- Used second kit to salvage parts for side boards
- Air brushed with Vallejo acrylic paint
- Lettering and numbers printed on paper then applied to car
- Weathered with Pan Pastels
- Load of trucks from scrap caboose
- Truck supports constructed from basswood
- Assorted load from scrap box

Both of these cars were inspired from photographs appearing in *Chesapeake and Ohio Color Guide to Freight and Passenger Equipment* by David Hickox
