Sam Delauter took charge and made announcements and conducted the contest, but we did not have a formal business session. The smaller attendance gave time for several interesting discussions and Mark had more time to help members run trains and answer questions, but unfortunately Mark had a lot of food leftover. We always enjoy our gathering at Mark's. Mark and his wife always go out of their way to provide us with an enjoyable time. For our 2024 running of the "Crusty", we need to be pro-active and inform everyone well ahead of time for this event so Mark won't have any food left! Thanks Mark, for hosting us. Those attending enjoyed a great visit.

Our October 14th meeting at the St. Albans Historical Society building will feature a short business session, raffle, contest, and several Mini-Clinics. The contest will be open loads which is usually a very popular category.

After the mini-clinics we will be discussing and distributing this year's "Challenge" packets to those who wish to participate. This year we are going to travel back into the late 50's and early 60's. During those times, modelers had very limited choices of ready to run rolling stock. As a result, you really had to become a builder to populate your model railroad. Modelers had to turn to manufacturers who offered craftsman or semi-craftsman kits. Two such manufacturers were Central Valley and Ulrich. From Ed Keith's estate we have obtained 14 Central Valley Old Timer freight car kits and 4 Ulrich kits. The Central Valley kits feature wood construction with metal hardware, couplers, and trucks. Sides and ends are pre-painted and lettered. The Ulrich kits feature all metal construction, ease of assembly, authentic designs, with painted and lettered sides. This "Challenge" project should be very interesting and what Gary intended this event to be—TRY SOMETHING NEW! During the December Christmas luncheon you will be able to display and talk about your "Challenge" project.

There are 18 packets available for this year's challenge. If you can't attend the October meeting and would still like to participate, the remaining packets will be available at the November meeting. If you can't make either meeting or want your packet earlier, let Dale Osburn (304-840-4366) know. Dale will contact you on how you can obtain your packet or will notify you of locations and times for pick-up of the remaining packets much like he did last year. 

PASSENGER MANIFEST John Harris, Membership Chair

I can not believe that the leaves have begun to fall and it is already October. Where did summer go? Days are shorter and darkness comes earlier, and by the end of the month, even that darkness will come even sooner. But, with the change on season comes more opportunity to dig deeper into those model railroad projects that have been on hold while travel and outdoor activities have monopolized my time. Work schedule has lightened up significantly as I wind down to that long awaited retirement. Finally I see larger blocks of time that can be spent on the A&NRR.

I am beginning to use my many years of AutoCAD experience to create some files that can be converted into some programs on a laser cutter. That should allow me to create some custom structures similar to those craftsman kits on the market. I have already created 2D elevations and plans for Thurmond station and engine house, the Hinton station and roundhouse, and a couple of miscellaneous structures that are not presently available on the market. Hopefully this might lead to a future clinic if this pans out as expected.

Next I hope to convert my familiarity with CAD programs to 3D printing. So far this has been more of a challenge. My AutoCAD program, while capable of creating 3D images, does not appear to download STL files or "print" to other files use in any of the printers. The learn-

ing curve for programs like Fusion may not be too difficult for me to pick up on but to date I have not had the time to even try. As many of you have already discovered, this technology will open up endless possibilities.

I continue to reach out for articles for the "Meet the Modeler" articles. No one stepped forward this month with information or volunteered to provide such and article. And while I am disappointed that no one took up the challenge, I too did not step up and provide one. I hope that others will find this an interesting way to let others know more about us, what we are doing and what brought us into the hobby. That said I will take my own advice and get started on my "bio".

Now, I challenge each of you to get out of your comfort zone and do the same. It need not be a long article as we are certainly not looking for your life story, nor details of you first girl-friend. It is more about your relationship to trains and model railroading. Again, I offer my assistance if you are still not sure how to go about this or need help with photos or questions.

I will not be joining you for the October meeting as this is the time my wife and I make our annual pilgrimage to Florida. This takes us into November and may even knock me out of that meeting, we will see. Meanwhile keep modeling and be safe.

While visiting my sister in Baltimore I was able to convince her and my wife to check out the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad Museum with me. The museum is located at the old Mount Clare shops in the heart of downtown. From the moment you arrive you're surrounded by railroad history: the parking lot is arranged between stub tracks full of old equipment. I noticed a wagon top boxcar and caboose, a wreck crane, and GP40. Inside the museum proper is a small gift shop and an exhibit on the ceremonial "first stone" laid for the nation's first common carrier railroad. There is also an exquisite model train layout of Baltimore, including the Inner Harbor, Camden Yards, and Pimlico racetrack. The only downside to the

layout was that it was in HO scale.

The highlight for most visitors to the B&O Museum has to be the roundhouse. It is a beautiful, bright space

with impressive displays of railroad history laid out among the stalls. As you work clockwise around the roundhouse you'll pass early "Tom Thumb" type engines with vertical

boilers, Civil War era 4-4-0 American locomotives, pretty 4-6-0s, and a three-truck Shay from the hills of West Virginia. There are also examples of the evolution of passenger coaches and the inside of an RPO.

However, the highlight for me was inside the dusty cavern of the North Car Shop. Tucked away on track 4 you'll find one of the most powerful steam locomotives ever built: C&O 2-6-6-6 #1604. It is a hulking beast that defies any attempt to capture its size in a mere photograph. And the cab was open to exploration, so you could actually work the throttle and pretend to tackle the grade over the namesake Alleghenies. The forward visibility out those tiny windows leaves something to be desired. The North Car Shop also has a rusty WM BL2, the short lived C&O "Chessie" L1 (a 4-6-4 under a flashy yellow and stainless jacket), and the first ever streamlined dieselelectric: a 1937 B&O EMD EA which was looking quite sharp with that extra rake on the nose (and a favorite of our own David Oliverio).

Outside the Roundhouse and the North Car Shop were more storage tracks holding yet more rolling stock. Most were lettered for the B&O, C&O, WM, or PM, reflecting many of the mergers over the years. There were exhibits on diner car china and reefer technology, the inside of a caboose and WWII troop sleeper, the C&O's old dynamometer, and yet another model train inside of and down the length of an old passenger coach. It was a fun layout, modeling B&O industries from the hills of Appalachia down to the port of Baltimore, but unfortunately it too was in HO scale. If you

bucks, you could ride a coach down the "first mile" of B&O's historic track pulled by a GP38 dolled up in a Chessie System paint scheme.

The B&O Museum certainly appeals to anyone with an interest in railroad history. You can learn more at https://www.borail.org. And who knows, a day at the Museum, followed by a heap of steamed blue crabs and a few National Bohemian beers, might even get a diehard C&O man to think about switching prototypes!


