Our October 14th meeting at the St. Albans Historical Society building was very well attended both in-person and virtually. The meeting featured a short business session, raffle, contest, and several Mini-Clinics. The Mini-Clinics included Sam Delauter demystifying the airbrush for us, Dale Osburn talked about the beginning phases of constructing a layout, and Herb Parsons did a very interesting presentation on restoring N scale buildings. The Mini-Clinics are becoming a very popular addition to our meetings, and they present a great variety of topics to learn about and discuss. Thanks, Sam, Dale, and Herb for your very well presented and informational clinics!

After the mini-clinics we distributed, I delivered a presentation on this year's "Challenge" packets. This year we are going to travel back into the late 50's and early 60's. From Ed Keith's estate we have obtained 14 Central Valley Old Timer freight car kits and 4 Ulrich kits. The Central Valley kits feature wood construction with metal hardware, couplers, and trucks. Sides and ends are pre-painted and lettered. The Ulrich kits feature all metal construction, ease of assembly, authentic designs, with painted and lettered sides. We only have 4 Central Valley kits and 1 Ulrich kit left. The remaining kits will be available at the November meeting, so please see Dale Osburn if you want to participate in the 2023 Challenge. Remember, this is not a contest but a challenge. It's going to be really interesting seeing and discussing the projects at the December meeting.

We will again try and keep the November business session short but we need to finalize our plans for a December Luncheon and discuss any Division plans for participating in the upcoming AMRS Train Show, Nov. 24, 25, and 26th in Huntington, WV. We will also allot some time to discuss issues or problems you may be having with the Challenge project. If you need help or extra parts or items, please let us know. To round out the November meeting the contest will be Passenger Cars, Tony Puccini will be conducting the raffle, and Mark Maynard will present the clinic on "Functionality of Switches".





N Scale Body Shop Sam Delauter

When I first came back to the hobby, I sought to build a fleet for my future Pennsylvania Railroad layout. One of the largest problems with the fleet was the lack of availability of H21a and GLa hoppers. While there had been a number of production runs of these hoppers, at the time they were nearly impossible to find. As I started to acquire some of these cars, I found that they had many issues. Not only would the couplers randomly fall out of the coupler boxes, but the axles were too short and would fall out of the trucks. The solution to make these hoppers run well was to body mount the couplers and replace the wheel sets with one with a wider axle. While the newer production runs do not have these issues, if you need a large fleet of these, you may still find quite a bit of the older run.

After reading other accounts of people body mounting in N and other scales, I started the ever growing project of body mounting all of my couplers and adding metal wheel sets to my rolling stock fleet.

So, why am I telling you this? I had slowed on this project as I am not doing much N scale these days. Recently I have started working on this project again. Over the last month, I have body mounted couplers to over 50 pieces of rolling stock. I plan to write a series of articles on how to body mount couplers on various brands and models of rolling stock. I figured that if I was doing the hard work to figure these out then other interested modelers should benefit from my efforts.

So why should we body mount in N scale? To begin with, standardization to Micro Trains couplers will help


with coupling during operation. Often, but not always, different brands of couplers will connect easily. When we are talking about operations, cuts of cars will back up with fewer derailments with body mount couplers. This won't be a problem when backing a couple of cars but backing long cuts can derail more easily. Each fall I used to run on the N scale layout at the Hinton Rail Museum. With the size of the layout, I was able to run 100 car trains on multiple lines. The vast majority of uncoupling came from cars equipped with Accumate couplers. When this uncoupling occurred, backing the train was often the easiest fix. This wasn't possible with longer cuts.

So, if you're saying that you aren't having operating issues with your fleet, then why should you body mount the couplers? Body mounting couplers allows you to lower the car to a much more realistic height. There is typically space in between the truck mounted coupler box and the frame of the car. Body mounting will require us to lower the car to have the coupler height meet NMRA standards. Body mounting will also allow you to shorten to the distance between rolling stock. While Micro Trains rolling stock has little additional space between cars, other brands have quite a bit of extra space. By body mounting you can sometimes remove a few scale feet of space between cars.

In my next column I will show to assemble Micro Trains 1015 couplers which will be the most common coupler used. That article will have pictures to better illustrate the process.






