Many of you with high speed internet access may be aware of Model Railroad Hobbyist, a monthly magazine distributed electronically at no cost to the reader. Check it out at www.mrhmag.com. This publication contains many features unavailable in a printed magazine including embedded video clips and model photos that can be rotated to see all sides. These features meant the publication is quite large, nearly 100 MB, making download via dial-up service an undesirable situation. There are lighter versions but they lack the full features.

In order to get more people to see the magazine and thereby command higher advertising rates, the publisher tells me that handing out data DVDs containing the magazine is not only permitted, it is encouraged. Indeed, it was suggested I put all issues to date onto DVDs for distribution to those with dial-up or no internet access. My thought is to ask for \$1 to cover the cost of the DVDs but I would donate that fee to the Coal Division. 




Achievement Program Bob Weinheimer MMR


A couple of Convention reminders:


A special "Carpet Cutting Ceremony" (the indoor



Interesting Reading For C&O Fans

The June 2011 issue of *Railroads Illustrated* which is published by the same publisher producing our own *NMRA Magazine* contains two articles which may be of interest to the C&O fans among us. The first article is about the dismantling of the "classic" C&O style cantilever signals and other types of signals in the Saint Albans area. These signals saw steam, early diesels and were a now gone icon of the C&O. The second article covers

the Piedmont Subdivision which ran from Richmond, VA to Gordonsville VA where it met the Washington sub to continue towards Charlottesville and Clifton Forge. The Piedmont was and is widely used to return empty coal and grain trains to the west. It is currently owned by CSX but leased to and dispatched and maintained by the Buckingham Branch RR. Both articles make for interesting reading for those of us who admire the old C&O.
