## FROM THE OFFICE DOWN THE HALL

"If it had been a snake it would have bitten me." How many times have we heard that old saying as we have looked and looked for something, "right under our nose" requiring numerous searches before we actually located the item. Sometimes, we have stumbled upon the presence of something interesting that we didn't realize existed, but was there all along. Such was the case with me this past weekend at the annual St. Albans C&O Modelers and Museum Modelers Weekend at Hawk's Nest, WV.

As a C&O modeler and historian, I am aware of the existence of many of the old towns along the line in the New River Gorge area. Most notable, of course, is Thurmond, the Dodge City of the East. I have visited there many times taking pictures, measuring structures and watching trains. Prince is another favorite town with its beautiful art deco depot with its atrium windows, Chessie Cat floor emblem and the huge coal mine mural on the wall. I once boasted I had the only model of the Prince depot in the world as I had never seen another one. I know there are several such models as of this writing. However, I know I am, still, the only one who has former Prince Station Agent Marvin Plumley's autograph and Amtrak stamp on the inner roof section of their model. So, there! Marvin has been a friend to the C&O Historical Society for years and many of the guys have accompanied him on numerous railfan trips. One such trip was the scheduled outing for this year's modeler's weekend; Nuttall, WV with Marvin as one of our guides.

I knew Nuttallburg had once existed as I had seen photo-

tos of the depot, tipple and a couple of houses. Little did I realize that it still exists, in a manner of speaking. As soon as I heard that a field trip to the restored tipple was in the offing, I was raring to go. I quickly discovered that the National Park Service has restored the old tipple and uncovered the foundations and footers of numerous old structures as well as a bank of a couple of dozen coke ovens. After a circuitous trip down in to the gorge, we reached the valley floor and came upon what remained of the old mining community. The relics just mentioned were fascinating with plaques showing old photos depicting the active days of the town. The keynote feature, however, was the rebuilt coal tipple complete with trackage. Taking in all that was there, we all realized what a thriving community it once was. A school, church, company store, depot and many houses surrounded the old tipple making up a self-contained entity within the deep confines of this remote area. At one time there were several villages up and down the old C&O with similar stories. For one modeling coal country, this place helps capture the look and feel of the history being recreated.

So, having traveled all around this little pocket many times over the years, I finally uncovered the "snake" that is Nuttall. It did indeed bite me, injecting a great deal of history, nostalgia and fascination for life in the Coal Division into my veins. The fun of the trip and time spent with my C&O buddies has certainly been a most pleasurable experience. Hopefully, you'll be snake bitten soon also.

## TRAVELS WITH DENNIS THE POTOMAC EAGLE EXCURSION Dennis McGeeney

Saturday, June 23, 2012, the date for the Coal Division Potomac Eagle excursion is approaching rapidly. A great deal of planning has been done for this trip and several members have already gotten their payments to me at the last meeting in St. Albans. The railroad has advised that if we sell twenty tickets we receive two free tickets which we may raffle off.

We will meet on the 23rd at 11:00 AM at Mario's Italian Restaurant at 33 South High St in Romney, WV (304-822-7776). There will be an opportunity to order from their five page menu and enjoy fellowship prior to our train ride.

The excursion itself departs Romney at 1:00 PM following the South Branch of the Potomac River and we arrive back in Romney at about 4:30 PM. The ticket office is an old B&O wagon top caboose and our motive power will be a C&O F7 diesel. We will also have an opportunity to observe the other equipment of the South Branch Valley RR. There is a possibility that we will be given a special photo runby at Romney after our return from the excursion. We will be assigned a car with tables for our comfort and to enable fellowship during the trip. As we travel the route we will see a Sears and Roebuck kit built home which was delivered by rail. There are several stone buildings crafted by German stonemasons in the early 1800s. The railroad reports that on ninety eight percent of trips bald eagles are seen from the train.

The day or our trip will be one of the longest days of the year for sun light. It is 232 miles from Charleston to Romney so some may want to consider making an overnight trip of it. There are several places to stay in the

Romney area. The Koolwink Motel on Rte 50 (304-822-3595) is clean and comfortable and features a fifties motif. The Hampshire House (304-822-7172) offers luxury rooms and fine dining. The South Branch Inn in Romney offers 61 rooms with many amenities (866-492-3122 [www.southbranchinn.com](http://www.southbranchinn.com)). For campers there is the Wapocoma campground right on the South Branch with 200 sites (304-822-7003 [www.wapocomacampground.com](http://www.wapocomacampground.com)).

There are many close by attractions should you decide to make a multi day trip of it. At Cumberland, MD is the five mile long ex B&O yard and shops as well as the scenic railroad trip over the former Western Maryland to Frostburg. At Elkins and Durbin, WV there are several scenic railroad options available. You can work your way down to Cass and ride to Spruce Knob behind steam. Other attractions nearby are Seneca Rocks, Seneca Cavern, the National Radio Astronomy Center, Harpers Ferry, Antietam Battlefield and the beautiful Potomac Highlands.

I will be in Maine for our April meeting but you can get your checks to Bob or Gary. You may mail your check to me at 509 Water St Summersville WV 26651 and call me anytime at 304 872-7262. You can bring your own food and drinks and anyone and everyone are invited to join us. Cost is \$42.00 per person, six to sixteen years old is \$20.00 and less than six years old rides free. I am really looking forward to seeing you there! PS parking meters in Romney are free on weekends. **Please note that all payments must be received by May 12.**

## NEWS FROM NATIONAL NMRA INFONET

As promised last month, here's the remainder of the news that came out of the winter Board of Directors meeting, held February 8 & 9, 2012, in Las Vegas.

### ***News from the Board meeting:***

The NMRA has a new Development Department Manager, charged with seeking out new donation sources and methods, and coming up with ways to expand our fund-raising potential. Alan Anderson of Salt Lake City, UT, volunteered to fill the slot, which had been vacant for several years. In his full-time job, Alan works with a Salt Lake City area chamber of commerce.

The "Cruise Convention" idea was officially declared "not popular enough to pursue." Initial estimates, dictated that the idea receive approximately 800 firm commitments from NMRA members, and only about 300 were received via the survey, which was printed several times in *NMRA Magazine* and also sent to Sacramento convention attendees.

The NMRA is in the final stages of selecting a volunteer Marketing Department Manager. To date, several professional candidates have responded to a "help wanted" ad in *NMRA Magazine*. The Marketing Director will help the

NMRA identify ways to retain and re-rail members, as well as recruit new ones.

Jenny Hendricks, NMRA Administration Director, reports that the number of RailPass members who convert to Regular members has reached the 80% mark. Congratulations to all of you whose hard work has made this goal a reality! Maybe we should try for 90- 100%?

The Celebration of Models in Grand Rapids will introduce a new contest award in memory of Dean Freytag, the "Dean of Styrene" and former national Contest Chair. The award is funded by a donation given to the NMRA in memory of Freytag and is named "The Dean Freytag Industrial Structure Award." The winning structure will be selected by the Contest Chairman.

### ***In other news:***

White River Productions, the company that prints *NMRA Magazine*, announced that it has purchased the assets of the now-defunct magazine, *Model Railroad News*.

## ACHIEVEMENT PROGRAM Bob Weinheimer MMR

Achievement Program activity among our members is really picking up. I noted last month that Clint Foster is now a Master Builder of Scenery and Dan Mulhearn is a Model Railroad Author, I hope their certificates will be arriving shortly. Just a few days ago we received word that David Robinette is a Master Builder of Structures and a Model Railroad Engineer—Electrical. Congratulations to David!

At the Dunbar train show Gary Burdette and I judged a number of modules built by Charlie Venable. A careful inspection showed these modules to contain some outstanding scenery, we judged it to a good solid merit level. The necessary paperwork will be submitted as soon as Charlie can get it together. Charlie's modules contain quite a bit of lighting and animation, we found almost enough for the Electrical Certificate as well. The only thing lacking was a turntable or wye that leads to the need to reverse electrical polarity. I trust Charlie can do something about that, perhaps by building a separate module containing one of these features.





### MCR CONVENTION
