

Sam Delauter called meeting to order. Last month's minutes approved

<u>Superintendent:</u> Sam appreciated support from the group as he worked through potential conflict with work for the meeting

Clerk: No report

Assistant Superintendent: Bill Stowe acknowledged all of Sam's efforts to ensure meeting would go smoothly if he couldn't make it. He also recognized Tony Puccini, Jerry Doyle, and Mark Maynard for their efforts to raise funds for the challenge through auctions of recently donated items.

<u>Newsletter</u>: Next deadline is Oct 27^{th.} <u>Achievement Program</u>: No updates

NMRA Updates: Softening on Division logo 'ban', region logo's are probably history. Electronic items will change quickly, physical items less quickly. More to come in next NMRA e-bulletin. If you're not getting these, please sign into NMRA website to update your email address.

Clinic: Spots available for next year. Currently have Jerry Doyle in January and Randy Allio in July. Randy encouraged everyone to participate, mini-clinics are a great way to start. Question from Steve Vickers as to what is expected led to good discussion.

T-TRAK: Herb Parsons provided recap on Altoona show. About 102 modules, multiple trains on different loops. For 1st time held clinics: signals by Atlas, state of N scale in Japan, LED lighting, weathering with acrylics. Clinics were a big hit and will probably continue next year. Membership: No update.

Raffle: \$63 from raffle, good participation. Additional \$135 from auction sales.

Old Business

Memorial challenge: Bob Osburn talked to this briefly, asking who had started on their models. Three had, pleased with the kits, and mentioned that vendor tutorials very good and highly recommended. Some confusion as to whether benefits from recent auctions would go towards this years challenge or for next years challenge. Need guidance from Jerry Doyle. on how much has been raised to date and need discussion on next steps. To be done next month.

<u>Division library:</u> Bill Stowe kicked off discussion with options. Good discussion on next steps. Question came up as to what is priority for our committee chairs. It was pointed out we do not fill the education chair, which may be more key to the group than library chair. Bill to follow up with other groups for how they use education position. We will revisit and decide on library next month.

New Business

December Meeting: It was decided to hold the meeting in St. Albans again. Format will be tables for folks to display their challenge models. It was suggested we have a couple of tables for a small T-Trak layout to have trains running to support the Christmas spirit. As opposed to folks bringing food as we did last year it was suggested we bring in pizza, Sam was going to check with St. Albans to see if they were ok with that. It was also suggested we open this to include family, this will be revisited next month to see what interest is and what numbers we might be dealing with.

<u>Huntington Train Show</u>: Three items were discussed:

Do we have a booth? – Decision was no due lack of interest the last few years and need to support following items.

Tables for items to sell – Need for a couple of tables to sell off more of donated items to support the challenge, and Robert Osburn needs some space to sell books. Volunteers were requested to staff the tables.

T-TRAK space and support for Herb Parsons. Comment was it would be great to have more folks participate in providing modules from the last year's challenge. Herb needs to know number of modules by November 1 to get needed space. Sam to send out email to members encouraging participation and for folks to let Herb know before Nov 1

Meeting was adjourned.

FROM THE OFFICE DOWN THE HALL Bill Stowe, Assistant Superintendent

One of my follow-ups from our last meeting was to explore what other parts of the NMRA do with the education committee chair position. Bob Weinheimer suggested that I reach out to our region representative for education, I have not yet done that. I have utilized the NMRA website to look at general recommendations for supporting the education mandate and using division newsletters to get an idea on how other divisions in our region do this (also available on the NMRA website).

To encourage others to leverage the website I will include the path of menus I followed to get to the specific information.

My first stop was to look for general recommendations from the NMRA. I used the Superintendent's Handbook (Regions/Regions and Divisions/Superintendent's Handbook). This tends to be a general guideline dated April 2016, with some specific direction on key areas. The guideline talks in depth to suggestions on how to run clinics, but simply refers to the leadership as 'Education/Clinic Program Chair'. To my mind it reads as one position, not two.

My second stop was to look at the newsletters from divisions in our region to see what they do on staffing the Education/Clinic Chair, and what they do under education (Regions/scroll down to Mid Central region). This is not as accurate as talking to division folks or attending their meetings, but it is a start. What I found can be summed up simply as:

- Every division is different.
- Not one has a education program chair.
- Not all have a clinic chair, although some still have clinics noted in their newsletter.
- Some seem to call clinics by another name like programs.
- Other divisions seem to focus on other activities like 'Bring and Brag'.

So, what are my thoughts on impact for our division?

- In our current world makes no sense to me to have an education chair as it would just duplicate the clinic chair role.
- What is significantly different in our division is the annual challenge.
- Filling the education chair may be something to look at when we begin to discuss how to continue supporting the challenge after Robert steps back. But my opinion is that we should focus first on how to support the challenge, and then see if the education chair is part of that answer.
- However we decide to continue to support the challenge I personally feel we should look at how to engage more folks rather than have one person go it alone as Robert has done. I'm not sure we fully understand how much time Robert has spent pulling the challenges together.


Mid-Ohio Valley Model Railroad Club By Mark Suek

PARKERSBURG- The Mid-Ohio Valley Model Railroad Club hosted a successful 30th Annual Fall Train Show at West Virginia University's Parkersburg campus on October 26. Tom Ratkovich served as chairman of this event for the final time. MOVMRC's Show is thought to be the third largest in West Virginia with more than 100 vendor tables. The Chesapeake & Ohio Railway Historical Society was represented with a booth at the show. Two of the most interesting artifacts at the show were a headlamp from an historically significant Shay geared steam locomotive, owned by Wayne Batten, and a Nathan five-chime horn from a Chessie System General Electric diesel locomotive, owned by Parker Atkinson.

Next on tap for the club are the nomination and election of officers for 2026, the annual Christmas Open House on December 6 at the club facility in the rear basement of NOE Office Equipment in downtown Parkersburg (hours are 10 am to 6 pm) and the annual Christmas Dinner on December 9. The Christmas Open House is part of Downtown PKB's annual Winterfest celebration.







Under Construction
