There are four candidates although only three have statements published. Please review those statements carefully then vote for who you think will be best for the NMRA and its membership.

The Mid Central Region ballot should be out soon but that election is less exciting with only one contested position. Again, read the candidates' statements carefully then make your choice.

Finally, it is getting close to the time make decisions about attending the Mid Central Region convention. Details are in another article but I understand early registration is being extended to the end of February. As has been noted before, region conventions are relative bargains with shorter programs and lower costs than national conventions. If you've never been to one, give it a try!

FROM THE OFFICE DOWN THE HALL

Dear General Membership and Education Committee Members,

Wow, the first meeting at the St. Albans C&O Depot, the "Official Clubhouse of Division 9," is history, and it was surely a success. We had a great turnout, and there was a buzz of excitement throughout the entire afternoon. I chose a salutation for this addition for I will be sending this column out to a few of you early (the new committee) by e-mail or letter, but I want everyone to be involved with the process of developing our educational outreach program which we have been discussing for quite a while. Part of our initial meeting, and to kick off the New Year, was dedicated to the establishment of an Education Committee. I feel we were successful, in our endeavors, for this outpouring of support alone!

The "I" part of our program will now become "we," as the information which has been gathered will not just be presented to the membership at think about, but will be studied and enhanced, tweaked, and developed by the committee into a formal program. Eighteen possible topics (the Australian Bob mentions in his column have seventeen.) have been mentioned previously for consideration. They were: Beginner's Guide, History, Standards, Careers, References, Era-Locale, Railfanning, Motive Power, Rolling Stock, Right-of-Way (including layout design, bench work, and electricity), Structures, Scenery, Operations, Communications, Painting, Industry, Scale Plans (articles and how-tos), and On-line Museum. As we talked at one meeting, I thought of "Show-and-Tell," and of merging some main topics and developing some sub-topics. That was presented in a possible plan which I'll send to the committee and have on display, again, at the next meeting. Several of the main topics (which were re-distributed into: Beginner's Guide, Motive Power, Rolling Stock, Structures, Right-of-Way, Operations, Scenery, and Museum) have had those from the original list included as sub-topics and most have Plans, Type of Railroad, History, Era/Locale, and Painting under the main heading as each of these may be addressed individually or as part of every major topic. The committee, then the membership, will decide what we want to do and how we want to do it, as plans develop.

We've kicked around some ideas. With our "new digs," we may set up an educational display made from a stand that is available to us. It is approximately six (6) feet by twelve (12) feet with the capability of presenting plans, photographs, and artifacts for viewing. I saw a similar one on the Hagerstown Roundhouse Museum web site, recently. It may be set up for permanent showing at the depot or moved to a library or other venue for special occasions.

Some examples of different topics have been presented graphically for possible inclusion on our web site. Because our

mandate is that we are a non-profit, educational organization, it has been discussed that we address Hobby vs. History, and Model vs. Prototype as we reach out to the public. Thus, the various topics listed above could easily be represented on a web site and include real trains and models along with the information which would help the members of the Boy Scouts of America study for their Railroading Merit Badge (we have sponsors among our membership) as well as educate the general public.

Many have seen, through the pages of *Up the Holler*, at the train show in Bluefield, or at our last meeting, the beautiful back drop and display stand that our Membership Chair, John Harris, has constructed as the "face" of our group which we present to the public. It will travel to a couple of shows each year and other venues in which we may decide to participate, depending upon the ability of our group to man the booth. John has had his "Scenery Clinic" on review on numerous occasions (both the mock-up and printed paperwork), and has generated much interest. With the inclusion of photographs (and the extra copies of *UTH* and the *NMRA Magazine*), a wonderful presentation representing our group has been prepared.

The Australian group has come up with a scenery clinic for kids (I'll have their instructions on display). They provide a small piece of foam board, some paint, glue, rocks, dirt, and ground foam. With some instructions, the kids "go at it." We may wish to do this same type of thing, weather cars, etc. SACOMM will be having an open-house in April and we could certainly participate adding our own ideas to the mix. Dennis has agreed to dress like a locomotive engineer and give a short description of "My job on the Railroad." Bob mentioned that a long-time member attended his first meeting last month (His New Year's resolution was to get more involved with Division 9.). Since we had considered building a small, portable layout (probably in N-scale) to take to malls, libraries, train shows, Robert, being an avid woodworker, volunteered to build the bench work. So, are these the kind of things we want to do?

I am calling for a meeting of the Education Committee at 1:30 just prior to the Division 9 February gathering at the depot. I'll have several of the documents I've displayed in the past as well as some of the Australian's ideas and some other items to initiate our discussions. All are welcome to join the committee and ideas are certainly wanted. If you are not comfortable with planning and implementing the program, your help setting up chairs and getting the displays ready, etc., prior to a presentation, would be just as valuable a contribution as working the event. Everybody, "All aboard!"

Welcome to the last edition of the NMRA InfoNet News under my watch.

The tour of the new, highly restricted Chinese High Speed Rail factory and facilities which Hasea.com, our NMRA counterpart in China, was going to schedule for the NMRA representatives has been temporarily cancelled, with the hopes of rescheduling later in the year.

The Winter Board of Directors Meeting will be held in Atlanta, Georgia, at the Sheraton Suites Galleria-Atlanta, on February 8-10. Although the Board meets in a closed caucus the evening of February 8, the general meeting is open to all NMRA members on February 9 and 10. This year's meeting has a jam-packed agenda, including discussions about the *eBulletin*, an electronic newsletter meant to supplement **NMRA Magazine**. Also, because membership dropped from 19,500 to 18,800 in one year, the Board will be discussing ways to attract new members. A task force which has studied the challenges of attracting Generation X, Generation Y, and Millennials will be making a report at the meeting.

The Board is reviewing bids for upcoming conventions. Indianapolis has thrown its hat in the ring for the 2016 convention, and Sydney, Australia, and Orlando, FL, may be vying for the 2017 convention. Nothing has been decided yet on either convention.

The NMRA continues to receive donations for "The Magic of Scale Model Railroading" Exhibit at the California State Railroad Museum. While we haven't yet hit our goal of \$250,000, we're getting closer every day to hitting the mark which will trigger a matching donation from an anonymous donor. If you, your Division or Region, have

As I mentioned last month, I've turned in my resignation as Communications Director, as of the Winter Board meeting next month. It's been a fun run and I've enjoyed it. I don't exactly know what the fate of these InfoNet News eblasts will be beyond this issue – that will be up to my successor. Last month I mentioned the passing of my friend and fellow model railroader, Gene Browning. In spite of the heavy snow of Jan. 17th; my wife and I were able to drive to Lexington, VA on the 18th for Gene's funeral. It was a tribute to Gene that the Church was packed, including a good number of the model railroading community of central Virginia. Gene was such a quiet guy that I did not know much about him except that he had worked in some capacity for the N&W at one time. Many hours were spent on Clint Foster's C&O, Bill Cox' Virginia & Blue Ridge Southern and Bob Burke's Sandy Creek & Southern alongside Gene and he never bragged, nor complained about his serious illness. At the funeral Gene's brother told us a lot about Gene. He was born and raised in the Lexington area, graduated from Virginia Military Academy and served in Vietnam. Gene then went to work as a civil engineer for the N&W and obtained advanced degrees in engineering from Washington & Lee University in Lexington. He taught engineering at a community college and became the head of the engineering department as well as the school's resident engineer. From 1992 to 2002 he was the county engineer for Rockbridge County. You meet some amazing people in this hobby and I am glad to have

known Gene Browning. After the funeral his wife, Pat, informed us that she expects some of "the boys" to come over once in a while and exercise the trains.

Well, it was snowing pretty hard in Pipestem so I called Dennis McGeeney and asked him how it was in Summersville. "Just fine, the roads are OK" he said. So, two and one half hours later, after driving on roads that were ice covered when they weren't snow covered and passing through several whiteouts I arrived in Summersville. I guess to a retired truck driver a little snow storm is nothing! At any rate we enjoyed a day doing wiring and track work on Walt Mycoff's layout. The first challenge was to figure where to put the gaps for what turned out to be a large reversing loop. Then we had to locate a short caused by reversed feeder wires. While we were working Walt called to see how we were doing. As the snow flew outside, Walt informed us he was in his bathing suit on an island in the Gulf of Mexico with his wife.. We should have hung up on him! But, when we left the trains were running everywhere on the layout and we were both smiling. Model railroading is fun!

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
